


Talking to Children about Race and Inequality

- The Pulitzer Center partnered with the New York Times to turn the 1619 project, a collection of
 essays and literary works observing the 400th anniversary of the beginning of American
 slavery, into a curriculum for teachers of all grade levels.
- Teaching Tolerance, a project by the Southern Poverty Law Center, periodically updates its resources on race, racism, and police violence.
